Advent 4 sermon December 22 2024

The 4th Sunday of Advent. We're getting closer, aren't we, to observing the birth of Jesus, and the importance of this event for the whole Creation, including you and me.

Well, just what is this importance? Why are we moved so deeply by the Christmas Story? Let me suggest three reasons, in no particular order.

Reason One. The birth of Jesus is <u>not just a story</u> of Mary and Joseph and their new child. No, the birth of Jesus is far more comprehensive than two parents and a newborn. We're talking about all of human history: past, present and future. And about who was responsible for this history and who continues to be engaged in it. And will see it through to some kind of conclusion.

You and I are born **curious**. We wonder about things, including how we as individuals and as a collection of individuals fit in. Fit in the past. Fit in the present. Fit in the future. What is life in general all about? And what are our particular lives all about?

Yes, we are **curious** creatures.

Reason Two for why the Christmas Story resonates with us. We are not just curious. We are **anxious**. What does it all mean? Where do we fit in? How soon will we find out? What happens next? And will we be ready for the "next"? And, if not ready, are we even slightly prepared to deal at all with what might be? We worry about these issues, don't we? And we're not just curious. We are **anxious** creatures. We stay busy. We challenge ourselves. We give thanks for a sense of being where we are and with whom we are. And where there seem to be gaps between hope and reality, we dream of filling those gaps ourselves or with the help of others.

Which takes us to **strategies**. Reason Three. Yes, we are **curious** and we are **anxious**. And how do we handle anxiety? We strategize. Yes, at our best we are **strategic creatures**. We set goals and we pursue those goals. And we feel better when we seem to be on track. And we feel worse when we seem to be off track.

So we adopt or develop ways of getting back on track, including, of all things, church attendance. Oh yes, there are vacations, there are hobbies, there is community service, there is a lawn to mow. But these outlets for our curiosity and anxiety seem to fall short of bringing peace to ourselves and others.

Something is missing. Or perhaps **Someone** – capital S - is missing.

Where is the void? We spend a lot of time wrestling with this question, don't we? And one of the ways we wrestle with the unknown is looking into the possibility that at some level, well beyond our pay grade, there really is an answer. That's where we are right now. And with this answer, comes the command to share the answer. That's a critical step also, isn't it? But it's not always easy.

You and I in this setting would say yes, definitely. We don't <u>have to be</u> here. <u>We're here by choice</u>. And it's a choice that has a lot of thought behind it. Now, some of this thought is skepticism. We are critical thinkers after all. But often – and this congregation is an example – our skepticism is subject to faith, to belief, to conviction, to experimentation, to satisfaction.

Indeed, for us, faith makes perfect sense. Something, Someone, is responsible for life, including our lives. And, not just **responsible for**, but **supportive of**. God with us. God with us as Creator. God with us as Son. God with us as Holy Spirit.

This sense of support is attributable to Someone. We didn't invent it. It came to us from Somewhere. We sense this Someone and **give this Someone a name**: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. We also know this Someone as our teacher, our friend, our challenger, and, **yes, our Savior**.

It's a pretty special relationship, isn't it. The Creator of the Universe with us.

Hard to believe. But believe we do. And we do so primarily because, by God's design, you and I are **reachers**. And also by God's design, we are **receivers**. Not inventors of God's Love, but **recipients** of God's love. And once received and processed, we are **sharers** of God's Love.

And here we are. Continuing to <u>reach</u> and continuing to <u>receive</u> and continuing to <u>share</u> and, always, <u>remembering</u> to give thanks to the Lord. Our lesson today

from the Prophet Micah ends with this description of the outcome of doing the Lord's work: "And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth; and he shall be the one of peace."

This desirable outcome is made possible by the Creator offering choices, and the likes of you and me responding to those choices. We reach and we receive. And we reach again and again, and we receive again and again. That's the nature of our pursuit of Truth. Well worth a profound "Thank you." And here we are. We reach, we receive, and yes we share, and yes we give thanks. And, as we do this, God responds with "Well done, good and faithful servants."

Thank you, Lord. It is our **privilege**. Amen.

Second Reading: Hebrews 10:5-10

Then I said, 'See, God, I have come to do your will, O God (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)." When he said above, you have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."
